Shelby County } us A P Famell of the first part &
James Cobb of the 2 part Whereas the party of the 1st
part being indebted to the second party in the sum
of two hundred and fifty dollars secured by promissory note
due the 25 of December 1859 and being anxious to
secure said debt do this day have them sell & convey
unto the 2 party a Certain slave girl named Tabby
about Eight or nine years of age now if pay made
in full or in part shall fail to be made on the first
part by the 25 day of December 1859 the second
part have power and are given the right to ad-
vertise the said slave girl & sell to the highest
bidder for cash after giving fifteen days notice
and after satisfying said note with all expenses
as belonging to the bidding & selling the balance
to be returned to the first party or any person
legally authorized to receive under him within
my hand and seal the 20 day of December
1858 Test of Good faith A P Famell Seal
