McConaughy, all my right, title, interest and estate, as said heir at law, or otherwise, in and to the following described real estate lying and being in the town of Montevallo, in said Shelby County, State of Alabama, to-wit: Those parts of lots number twenty-six (26) and twenty-seven (27), according to the plot of said town, fronting on Valley Street and extending back from said Valley Street one hundred and twenty-nine feet and nine inches; being the western portions of said lots upon which the said William McConaughy Sr. resided at the time of his death, and known as "The McConaughy lot." To have and to hold unto the said W. P. McConaughy, his heirs and assigns forever.
