AFFIDAVIT

Before me the undersigned authority in and for said County in said State personally appeared the undersigned Edward S. Lymanwho, being dulysworn, deposes and says:

I am sixtyseven years of age, and reside in Montevallo, Alabama, and have lived in Montevallo all my life except for two years when I was a small boy. I am familiar with the tract of land described as follows:

"Begin at the southeast corner of the northeast quarter of the southeast quarter (NEW of SEW) of Section 20, Township 22, Range 3 west; thence run on an angle north 45 degrees west a distance of 2572 feet to a stake on top of the hill; which point is the center of a one acre tract of land hereby described; thence on an angle north three degrees west a distance of 104.37 feet to the point of beginning; thence north eighty seven degrees east 104.37 feet to the northeast corner of the one acrestract hereby described, thence on an angle south 3 degrees east a distance of 208.74 feet: thence on an angle south 67 degrees west a distance of 208.74 feet; thence on an angle north 3 degrees west 208.74 feet; thence on an angle north 87 degrees east 104.37 feet to the point of beginning. Also a right of way 25 feet wide extending from the above described one acre tract to the Aldrich-Montevallo Road, described as follows: Begin on the north and south Sectionlline between Sections 20 and 21 ownship 22, Range 3 west where the center line of the Aldrich Montevalloroad would intersect if extended, thence run on an angle north 60 degrees west a distance of 1600 feet, thence on an angle north 80 degrees west a distance of 328 feet to the point of beginning, which point is the center line of the 25 foot right of way at the Aldrich Montevallo road, on an angle north 3 degrees west a distance of 685 feet to the south line of the above described one acre tract.

I have known said lands and been familiar with them practically all my life. They are a part of the lands which formerly constituted the home place of Edmund King, to whom they appear from an abstract tohave been granted by the United States and by the University of Alabama, prior to 1826. The old King home still stands on the tract of which said lands are a part, and is reputed to have been built by him in 1823. Said lands, including the lands first hereinabove described were inthe actual possession of Edmund King as long as he lived, and after his death were sold by the Administrator of his estate to Frank R. King, or rather by the executors of the Will of Edmund King; said lands were then sold by the Administrators of the estate of Trank R. King to French Nabors on July 2nd, 1894. Mr. French Nabors thereupon took possession of said Lands and occupied them as his home until his death and his widow and children continued to occupy the same until the death of his widow Mrs. .S.E. Mabors. On October 23, 1902, Mrs.F. May Lyman, Burr Nabors and L. N. Nabors, who were all the

children of French Nabors, deceased, conveyed said lands to their mother, Mrs. S. E.

Nabors, by deeds recorded in Deed Book 28, page 160; and deed book 28, page 158, in the office of the Judge of Probate of Shelby County, Alabama, Mrs.Lyman being joined by her husband in said deed executed by her. On April 25th 1914, Mrs. S. E. Nabors conveyed said lands to Burr habors by a deed which is recorded in Deed Book 55, page 536, in the office of the Judge of Probate of Shelby County, Alabama, the lands described insaid deed embracing the lands first hereinbefore described; and Burr Nabors and wife conveyed the said lands first hereinbefore described to the Warrior Water Company on August 31, 1929,

The "arrior "ater company's water tank and tower are now situated on said one acre tract. Said tract of land, as stated, came from the United States to the King Family and from the University of Alabama to the King family, and from the King Family to the Nabors family, and only members of those two families have ever owned the same until said one acre tract and right of way were sold to Warrior Water Company. The Nabors family have been in actual possession of same for the past 34 years. It was, as stated, a part of the home place, and has been under fence and usedin connection with the home place practically all the time until the house and part of the lands were sold, and thereafter was under fence and in the actual possession of Mrs. S. E. Nabors and he son, Burr Nabors, successively until Burr Nabors sold and conveyed the same to Warrior Water ompanyand no one so far as I know or have heard, ever disputed his title to or possession of the same. Burr Nabors and his predecessors in his chain of title to said lands have to my knowledge, been in the actual, open, notorious, continuous, adverse pos session of said lands for more than thirty years prior and up to the time of the conveyance thereof by him to the Warrior Water Company.
