Before me, Grace Carter, a Notary Public in and for said County, in said State, personally appeared A.A.Brasher, who is known to me and who, being by me first duly sworn, deposes and says:

Tam acquainted with the south half of the southeast quarter of Section 33 Township 19 Range 1 West Shelby County, Alabama, and have known said land for sixty or sixty five years and have lived on adjoining land for more than forty years, I bought this land from Saginaw Lumber Company some time in the year 1909, as I recall it, but this deed has been lost or destroyed or misplaced and I have no idea where it is. I sold the land and deeded it to G. W. Meldon in 1910, Later on in 1935 it was discovered that this deed of mine was not of record and I went ot Birmingham and interviewed Mr.H.L. Badham Jr., who was President of Brewer Land Company, a corporation, which was the successor to Saginaw Lime & Lumber Company, which was in turn the successor of Saginaw Lumber Company, and explained to him the loss of my deed and thereupon Brewer Land Company executed a quit claim deed to Fred Vogala, which deed is dated J na the 6th 1935, and which is recorded in the Frobate Office of Chelby County, Alabama, in deed book 98 at page 411.

W.A.J.Blackerby deeded this land on the 13th day of April, 1925, Said W. N. Jewell died four or five years ago, as I recall it, and left surviving him four children, viz: Clarence Jewell, Orin Jewell, Reginald Jewell and Raymond Jewell. These four children constituted the sole heirs at law and next of kin of said W. N. Jewell at the time of his death.

The deed of Saginaw Land Company to me reserved no interest in said land, but conveyed the entire fee simple title. When W.A.J.Blackerby bought the land from G.W.Weldon on the 28th day of January, 1915, he cleared up something like tean acres or more of said land and cultivated it continuously each and every year until he deeded it to W. N. Mewell in 1925, and was in the actual, open, notorious, continuous, exclusive, adverse possession of said land during that period of time, exercising acts of ownership over it. When W. N. Jewell bought the land from W. A. J. Blackerby he went in to immediate possession of said land, built a house on it, lived upon it, and cultivated portions of said land each and every year until his death, and after his death and continuously up to the time the dewell heirs deeded the land to J. T. Johnson they, or one of them, was in possession of this land living upon it, cultivating portions of it, each and every year. J. T. Johnson deeded the land to Fred Vogala on the 15th day of April, 1935 and he moved upon it and remained upon it, exercising acts of ownership and cultivated portions of it each and every year until he deeded it to N. A. Miller on the 8th day of April 1937.
