Before the undersigned authority personally appeared Mae Bell Grenn, who is known to me, and who being by me first duly sworn, deposes and says:

R. H. Glaze also known as Reuben H. Glaze, who is grantee in that certain deed executed by T. J. Martin and wife, on October 25, 1893, and recorded in the probate Office of Shelby County, Alabama, in deed book 17 page 402, was my grandfather. Said R. H. Glaze had several children, but only two lived to maturity. The others died in youth. The two children of R. H. Glaze above referred to were Mollie Glaze and Victoria A. Glaze, leter Victoria A. McRae.

Said R. H. Glaze, my grandfather, was grantor in that certain deed executed to Mollie P. Bell, my mother, who was one of the aforementioned daughters of said R. H. Glaze, dated November 14, 1907, and recorded in the Probate Office of Shelby County, Alabama, in deed book 35 page 229. My mother and father were divorced and she later married C. H. Glaze. My mother, Mollie P. Glaze, died in August 1910, and left surviving her' four children as follows: E. Vecil Bell, known as Cecil Bell, Alsey F. Bell, known as A. F. Bell, affient Mae Green, and Henry Bell, a person of unsound mind. Said Cecil Bell died intestate some five or six years ago and left surving him his widow, Ola Bell, and children as follows: Priscoll Bell, Osborne Bell, Evelyn Bell, Joyce Bell Gibson, Otha Bell, Hope Bell, A. W. Bell, A. F. Bell, Wales Bell and Ellis Bell. Said Ellis Bell is dead and left surviving him his widow, Jewel Bell, who later married and is now Jewell Bozeman, and one child, Jerry Bell, an infant.

Victoria A. McRae, the other daughter of said R. H. Glaze, died about 1926 or 1927. She never had any children and left surviving her her husband, D. A. McRae, who died six or seven years after she did. At the time of the death of Mrs. McRae, her sole heirs at law and next of kin entitled to share in the distribution of her estate were the children and grandchildren of said Mollie P. Bell, who is the same person as Mollie P. Glaze. My mother, Mollie p. Bell, went into possession of the property immediately after the execution of the aforementioned deed to her by R. H. Glaze, which property is described in said deed, lived upon it and had portions of it cultivated each and every year until the time of her death. At her death her then husband, C. H. Glaze remained in possession of said property for about fifteen years until he died, and after his death the four children of said Mollie P. Bell obtained possession of said property through ejectment suit in the Circuit Court of Shelby County, Alabama, against the widow and heirs at law of said C. H. Glaze. Said ejectment suit was determined in their favor on February 2, 1925, and said property was delivered to them under and by virtue of said decree, and they have been cultivating it or having it cultivated with tenants upon it continuously down to the present time. All this is true of all of said property except the EE of NE of Section 30, Tp. 19, Range 3 East, of which their mother was in possession at the time of her death and of which her heirs at law have benn in continuous possession from the date of her death to the present time. The property deeded to Victoria A. McRae from R. H. Glaze on November 14, 1907, embraces all the NVA of Section 29, Tp. 19, Range 3 East, as well as all that portion of the SWA of said Section lying north and east of Coosa River. Fraction H, as conveyed in said deed embraces the SWA of N% and all that portion of the N% of S% lying north of Coosa River and Fraction G embraces the SE of Nik and all that partof the Nik of Sik north of Coosa River in said Section 29. At the death of said Victoria A. McRae, her husband, D. A. McRae, remained in possession of said real estate belonging to Victoria A. McRae, by a right of curtesy until his death some six or seven years later, and at the death of said D. A. McRae, the heirs at law of Mollie P. Bell, the mother of affiant, went into possession of said property and have had continuous possession of it down to the present date, and each year cultivated portions of the same or had it cultivated with tenants on it each and every year, and are still in possession of it.

The heirs at law and next of kin of Mollie p. Bell are correctly named and described in the bill now pending in the Circuit Court of Shelby County, Alabama, to sell the Mollie p. Bell land and the Victoria A. McRae land for division among the joint owners, and the property therein described in said bill is correctly

Pruitt, a widow, deeded to Mollie P. Bell on the 18th day of January, 1909, which last mentioned deed is recorded in the Probate Court of Shelby County, Plabama, in deed book 46 page 44, and to this entire forty the Mollie P. Bell heirs have had possession on continuously and in the same character possession as they had of the other land for more than twenty years.
