Upon consideration thereof, it is ordered, adjudged, and decreed by the Court as follows:

FIRST: That the bonds of matrimony heretofore existing between the Complainant and Respondent are dissolved, and that the said W.N. Finley us forever divorced from the said Laura Finley for and on account of voluntary abandonment of the bed and board of the Complainant by the Respondent for two years next preceding the filling of the bill, as alleged in the Bill of Complaint.

SECOND: That W.N. Finley is hereby permitted to against contract marriage, subject to the provisions of Paragraph Four hereof.

THIRD: That the costs of Court accrued herein be and the same hereby is taxed against the Respendent for the collection of which execution may issue and if such execution is returned "no property found" then execution for costs may issue against the Complainant.

FOURTH: That the Complainant shall not marry again except to the Respondent until sixty (60) days after this date, and if an appeal from this decree is taken within sixty (60) days from the date hereof, he shall not marry again except to the Respondent during the pendency of said appeal.
