To my personal knowledge, Fred Yarbrough bought Tract One from Jno. W. Hawkins in 1947. Jno. W. Hawkins had bought said property from Walter M. Heaton and wife, Julia Heaton, about the year 1939. Walter M. Heaton had bought the place from Nannie Busse, a widow, who owned the property when I first became familiar with said property.xxxxx xxxxNannie Busse is now dead. She nor none of her heirs nor any persons claiming through her have claimed or possessed said property, or any part there, since Mannie Busse sold said property to Walter M. Heaton, as aforesaid. Nellie H. Bardsdale, J. F. Oates, Ellis H. Oates, and Virginia Oats Watson, have ever claimed or possessed said property or any part thereof, since I first became familiar with said property. Fred Yarbrough and his predecessors in title, as aforesaid, have to my personal knowledge for the past 23 years, and until the present date, been in open, continuous, exclusive, perceable, undisturbed adverse possession of all of said property, claiming the same against the world and against the claims of all persons whatsoever. Jono. W. Hawkins nor none of his heirs or devisees nor any persons claiming through him have possessed or claimed said property or any portion thereof since said Jno. W. Hawkins sold said property to Fred Yarbrough in 1947.

To my personal knowledge, Fred Yarbrough bought Tract Two from Henry Riney in 1937. Said Henry Riney, who was a single max man, had bought said land from the State for taxes a short time before, in 1936 or 1937. Said land had been acquired by the State for non-payment of taxes. Fred Yarbrough and his predecessors in title, the said Henry Riney, as aforesaid, have to my personal knowledge for the past 23 years, and until the present date, been in open, continuous, exclusive, peaceable, undisturbed, adverse possession of all of said pux property, claiming the same against the world and against the claims of all persons whatsoever. Joe Hull, nor his heirs or devisees, norany persons claiming through him, have poasessed or claimed said property or any portion thereof since I first became familiar whith with said property.

I have never heard anyone question the title of Fred Yarbrough/to either Tract one or to Tract two.
