My name is Agnes W. Armstrong. I am 64 years of age and have lived in Shelby County, Alabama, all of my life. I am familiar with the hereinafter described land and the persons in possession of it all my life. Said land being described as follows:

The NW of SW Section 25, Township 20 South, Range 1 East;

Also So of NW of SW and SW of SW of Section 24, Township 20 South, Range 1 East;

The St of St of SWt of NWt, Section 25, Township 20 South, Range 1 East;
The SEt of NWt, Section 25, Township 20 South, Range 1 East;
EXCEPTING highway right of way;

situated in Shelby County, Alabama.

There has been called to affiant's attention that a Bond of title was given by
W.L. Tumlin and J. W. Tumlin to A. G. Lamar, W. C. Horton and W. O. Perry in 1918
covering certain land which included, among other lands the Swi of Nwi of said
Section 25. Affiant says she knows said persons never owned or claimed any interest in
the Irvin Wingard land described above during all the years she knew it. The
said Irvin Wingard was her Uncle and he occupied the land and raised his family on it,
farmed parts of it and obtained firewood and building timber from portions of it
each and every year as far back as she can remember.

There is called to affiant's attention a mortgage from E. W. Bentley to Wilsonville State Bank dated November 1, 1921, covering  $W_2$  of NW $_1$  of said Section 25. I have known E. W. Bentley all of his life and I know that he never claimed or made any pretense to own any interest in the above described land.

There has been called to affiant's attention an agreement between A. F. Estes and S. P. McDonald which is recorded in Deed Book 77 page 88 in the Probate Office of Shelby County, Alabama, involving Swi of Nwi and Ei of Nwi of said Section 25. Affiant says during all the years she knew said land that neither A. F. Estes nor S.P. McDonald nor anyone else have ever owned or claimed to own or was in possession of said land, except for Irvin Wingard, who was in the continuous ownership and occupancy throughout the years, as mentioned above.

Affiant further says that the SW2 of SW2 and S2 of NW2 of SW2 of said Section 24 were in timber land throughout the years and that SE2 of NW2, NW2 of SW2 and S2 of S2 of SW2 of NW2 of said Section 25 were in cultivation mostly and it was used partly as a pasture and was part of the homesite of Irvin Wingard and he raised corn, cotton and a garden on it each and every year during his lifetime and parts of these parcels were under fence. Irvin Wingard used the property as mentioned above and remained in actual possession of all of it until his death about the year 1950 or 1951. Ann W. Armstrong, Irvin Wingard's daughter, and her husband continued to live on the land until her death last August, 1966. Her husband, John Armstrong had died a short time prior to her death. Since Ann Wingard Armstrong's death, the heirs of Irvin Wingard have been in possession of said land.

My name is Irvin Armstrong. I am 52 years of age and am a gredison of Irvin Wingard and am one of his heirs, my Mother, Ann. Wingard Armstrong having died last year. I have lived near the land described in the foregoing affidavit of Agnes W. Armstrong all of my life and have been on the land frequently throughout my life. The Wingard homeplace was situated in the NWt of SWt of said Section 25 and there were some berns and outhouses on this forty acres, and the same was fenced on its west, south and east side. The 10 acres lying north, being the St of St of SWt of NWt of said Section 25 was also under fence. There was a field in cultivation on the southwesterly side of SFt of NWt of said Section 25 and other portion of it was used for timber growing and Irvin Wingard cut the timber from this portion and the remainder of the property on several occasions that I remember. The heirs listed by Agnes W. Armstrong are correct.
