

ORDINANCE NO. 22-45

AN ORDINANCE TO REAPPORTION COUNCIL DISTRICT BOUNDARIES FOR THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, ALABAMA.

WHEREAS, Section 2-2-62 of Ordinance No. 00-194, provides that within six months of the publication of the last Federal Census of the population of the City of Birmingham, there shall be a reapportionment of the Council districts in the manner hereinafter provided:

- "(a) The President of the City Councilor any member thereof shall, within six months after the publication of the last federal census of population for the City, file with the City Clerk a proposed ordinance containing a recommended plan for reapportionment of the Council district boundaries to comply with the following specifications:
 - Each district shall be formed of contiguous and, to the extent reasonably (1)possible, compact territory and its boundary lines shall be the center lines of streets or other well-defined boundaries.
 - (ii) Each District shall contain as nearly as is reasonable the same population. The proposed ordinance shall include a map and description of the districts recommended.
- "(b) The Council shall consider the redistricting plan or plans filed with the City Clerk as follows:
 - (i) The order of consideration of any plan shall be in the order of said filing with the City Clerk.
 - (ii) After a proposed ordinance is filed with the City Clerk and prior to its consideration for adoption, the City Clerk shall place a resolution on the Council agenda within ten days which shall set a date for public hearing by the Council for consideration of such ordinance, such hearing to be set no less than 28 days nor more than 42 days from the date of passage of such resolution, and, which shall also provide that notice that a redistricting ordinance shall be considered shall be published once a week in a newspaper of general circulation in the City for the three (3) successive weeks prior to the scheduled hearing, setting out a general



description of the subject of the hearing, the date, and time of the hearing and that a copy of the ordinance will be available for public inspection in the Office of the City Clerk during normal business hours.

- (iii) No such ordinance shall become effective until after a public hearing in relation thereto, at which citizens shall have an opportunity to be heard. The first of such proposed ordinances which receives five (5) affirmative votes of the Council shall be deemed the duly enacted redistricting ordinance.
- "(c) Such redistricting ordinance shall not apply to any regular or special municipal election held within (6) months after its becoming effective or until necessary approval of preclearance has been obtained pursuant to the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended, and the applicable procedures contained in Part 51 of the Code of Federal Regulations, whichever is later. No incumbent Council Member shall be deprived of his or her unexpired term of office because of such redistricting."; and

WHEREAS, the 2020 Decennial Federal Census was released to the City of Birmingham in final form in August 2021; and

WHEREAS, a proposed map and ordinance were filed with the City Clerk on or about February 17, 2022; and

WHEREAS, on February 22, 2022, the Council adopted Resolution No. 331-22, which set a public hearing to be held during a special called meeting of the Council on March 29, 2022 at the Birmingham CrossPlex at 5:30 p.m. and required publication of notice of the hearing once a week in a newspaper of general circulation in the City for the three weeks preceding the hearing; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on March 29, 2022, pursuant to Resolution No. 331-22, at which the Council received comments on the proposed map and ordinance; and

WHEREAS, during the hearing on March 29, 2022, the Council left the hearing open to receive additional comments and make final adjustments to the proposed map during a period ending April 19, 2022; and

WHEREAS, on April 12, 2022, the Council adopted Resolution No. <u>666-22</u>, restating its intent to continue to receive comments and to consider adoption of the final proposed map and ordinance on April 19, 2022; and

WHEREAS, Appendix One, attached hereto and incorporated herein, sets forth each reapportioned Council District in accordance with the requirements set out in Section 2-2-62 of said Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, Appendix Two, attached hereto and incorporated herein, sets for the guidelines for the 2020 redistricting of the City of Birmingham; and

WHEREAS, Appendix Three contains the reapportionment map depicting the nine single member




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council district boundaries for each council district of the City of Birmingham which by reference is incorporated herein and maintained in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Birmingham. Such map shall be available for inspection by the public at all reasonable times; and

WHEREAS, it is the duty of the Council of the City of Birmingham to enact a redistricting ordinance:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, ALABAMA that:

- Section 1: The Council does hereby adopt and approve the reapportionment plan encompassing the areas within the City of Birmingham establishing the new boundaries for the nine (9) Council districts of the City as specifically described and set forth in Appendix One and by the reapportionment map set forth in Appendix Three and on file in the office of the City Clerk, said descriptions being attached hereto and incorporated herein in full by reference.
- Section 2: The designation and boundaries of the nine single-member Council districts for the City of Birmingham are specifically described and set forth in Appendix One. Appendix One is incorporated herein as a part of this Ordinance and is on file in the office of the City Clerk; and
- **Section 3:** The "2020 Redistricting Guidelines for the City of Birmingham" is made a part of this Ordinance by reference hereto as Appendix Two.
- Section 4: The reapportionment map depicting the nine single-member Council district boundaries for each Council district of the City of Birmingham is made a part of this Ordinance by reference hereto as Appendix Three and is on file in the office of the City Clerk.
- Section 5: In the event there is a conflict in the Council district boundary lines set forth in Appendix One and Appendix Three, the boundary lines depicted on the map (Appendix Three) shall govern.
- Section 6: If any part or section of the Ordinance is declared or becomes invalidated for any reason, then the remaining portion of this Ordinance shall not be affected and shall remain in full force and effect.
- Section 7: All Ordinances of the City of Birmingham or parts of such Ordinances inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby expressly repealed.
- Section 8: This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage, approval and publication, or as otherwise provided by law. Within a reasonable time after the adoption of this Ordinance by the Council, the Clerk of the City of Birmingham shall file with the Judge of Probate of Jefferson County, Birmingham Division and of Shelby County, a certified copy of this Ordinance accompanied by the map contained in Appendix Three which shows the boundaries of all such Council districts.

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GUIDELINES FOR CITY OF BIRMINGHAM

2020 REDISTRICTING

Alabama law commits the authority to adjust boundaries for municipal election districts to the discretion of the local jurisdictions themselves. Ala. Code, 1975, Sec. 11-46-23; Sec. 11-43-63. Under its local ordinance § 2-2-62, the City of Birmingham must redraw its City Council and School Board districts to account for population changes that are reported in each U.S. Census.

Having noted the publication of the 2020 U.S. Census in August of 2021, the City Council of Birmingham now proposes to draw a new map containing nine electoral districts which, upon final approval and enactment, will take immediate effect as the governing districts for the Birmingham City Council and Birmingham School Board.

The districts defined in the newly enacted map will be utilized in the next regularly scheduled city elections during this decade for elected positions on the Birmingham City Council and Birmingham School Board (i.e., in 2025 and 2029, and if necessary under existing law, in any special elections due to vacancies following the date of the new map's enactment).

The following general guidelines shall govern the process for developing the new map of election districts for the City of Birmingham following the 2020 Census:

- 1. **Equal Population**: Districts will comply with the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which commands that election districts contain equal populations. Under local ordinance, the governing standard is to craft election districts "as nearly as is reasonable" to the same population. Using the dataset and defined geographical units from the 2020 U.S. Census (specifically, PL 94-171), the Council will consider map proposals with nine single member districts whose total populations lie within a range of plus-or-minus 5% deviation of the mathematically ideal district size of 22,304 persons.
- 2. Compliance with Law: Districts will comply with existing state and federal law, including the Voting Rights Act § 2, which assures that "No voting qualification or prerequisite to voting or standard, practice, or procedure, shall be imposed or applied by any State or political subdivision in a manner which results in a denial or abridgement of the right of any citizen of the United States to vote on account of race or color" § 52 U.S.C. 10301(a).
- 3. **Contiguity:** In accordance with Local Ordinance § 2-2-62, each election district must be fully contiguous, i.e., connected to the remainder of the district, while accounting for the city's existing boundaries (which includes certain non-contiguous areas).
- 4. Compactness: Districts shall be reasonably compact by standard measures, while accounting for the city's existing boundaries. Local ordinance § 2-2-62 states that districts "to the extent

reasonably possible" must include compact territory and that boundary lines shall be the center lines of streets or other well-defined boundaries.

- 5. Communities of Interest: Districts, where practicable, will respect existing communities of interest i.e., geographic areas that reflect shared political, social, or cultural interests. Communities of Interest include (but are not limited to) the boundaries of the 99 city-recognized Neighborhoods. The public is encouraged to provide input detailing specific communities of interest that ought to be preserved where practicable.
- 6. Maintaining District Representation: Where possible, maps should avoid creating districts that lack existing representation. In light of the city's recent elections and the immediate effect of a new district map, respect for the expressed choices of Birmingham voters favors assuring that every redrawn district include one representative (note, however, that the assignment of a specific geographic area to a particular representative may change). Accordingly, residences of current City Council and School Board members will be included in the information used in the redistricting process; however, this consideration alone will not take priority over the other principles described in these guidelines.


